March 1821.</p>	<p>Four.</p>	<p>None as yet established.</p>	<p>None</p>	<p>has only 2</p> <p>This College is of private ^{of private} endowment: The late James M^r fell, in his lifetime of Montreal Merchant, left by his will an estate of 40 acres near the city, of Montreal the endowment consisting of 45 acres of land with a house & buildings thereon near Montreal, together with a legacy of £10,000; left by the late J^r M^r fell of Montreal Merchant (who died in 1813.) to found a College to be called McGill College. The real Estate was not recovered from the heirs at law until 1829: The legacy only in 1835. The principal and interest thereof of final judgment for the legacy was only obtained before H. M. in Privy Council in 1835. and the amount has not yet been recovered from the heirs at law: - Principal and interest now amount to £22,000; which by the will of the Testator is to be paid over by the Testamentary Trustees to the Royal Institution for the advancement of Learning in L. Canada where that Institution shall have created and established a College on the real Estate devised; which is to be applied by them towards the expenses of erecting a College & towards maintaining the establishment thereof.</p>		<p>The Gov^t of this College, by the Charter, are</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Gov^t in 1831. surrendered the Grants Estates to the Provincial Legislature without any reservation in favor of these Schools: - The Salaries were granted as before, for one year, and were then reduced to £100. with ⁱⁿ 1833. with the condition annexed that a certain number of poor scholars should be taught: And since that period there has been no legislative appropriation: The Salaries being insufficient to enable the Trustees to provide the necessary assistance to keep up ^{to keep up} the establishments having this become ^{been} into ^{into} Charity Schools, they have gradually fallen off in efficiency; & presently ^{presently} at ^{at} Quebec ^{at} has been closed.</p>		<p>In 1815. His late Majesty's Gov^t directed that the revenues of the Estates belonging to the late order of Jesuits should be applied to the erection & foundation of McGill College, & also directed that Royal Grammar Schools should be established at Quebec & Montreal: The execution of these intentions so far as regard McGill College was suspended by a subsequent order. But two Grammar School Schools of Royal Foundation were established in 1815 at Quebec & Montreal with Salaries of £200 payable from the revenues of the Jesuits Estates to each of the Trustees: These Trustees were</p>
