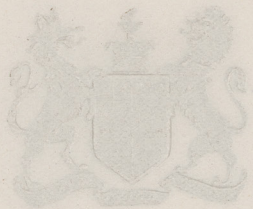

I write specially to ask what you think the best way of helping on French evangelizing? I try in what I give away, to give to what others neglect & overlook; & nothing is more neglected than French work. I give quite a good deal (relatively speaking) to the French Salvⁿ: Army and lay out a good deal too on French tracts the "Sleep of Day" in French, & other such literature; & find outlets for them through existing channels, colporteurs, &c. who are usually glad to get them.

Among the Denominations, the Presbyterians are undoubtedly doing the most French work; and at the meeting "General Assembly" just

them the pure gospel, & the Word
of God. But with all this, the
Presbyterians are sufficiently apathetic
as to allow 100 children
a year to be turned away from
the Pointe aux Trembles Schools
for want of accommodation!!
What a lost opportunity. —

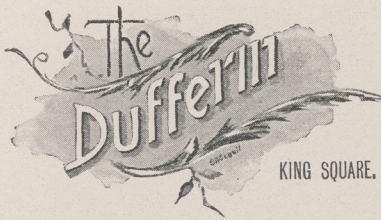
The Presbyterians are a strong
church and ought to do more;
but at present their energies are taxed
in Home Mission work to the N.W. and
B.C. where the Census has found the
great bulk of the "Unchurched" & "unclassified."

Could the Gospel Mission scheme of 2424 St. Battersea St., make use of larger funds? Is the work being pushed on? and its extension only a matter of more means?

Or, do you think it would be better to contribute to the Presbyterian work? (I ^{will send you} enclose recent articles on this, from the "Presbyt. Record" - [ordered but not yet received])

It seems a small matter - the little I can give - to raise a question about; but still one wants to do what is to the best advantage.

The large Missions are the most economically managed; & the most needy at present are the old "London Missionary Socy"; the worthy "Moravian Mission", and the "China Inland" owing to the exceptional expenses it has had. These have



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all offered thro' the "War charities"
the "Indian famine" and these
"Century Funds" drawing off the
general means available for their
support. The Y. M. C. A. are now
doing a splendid "Foreign work,"
~~an~~ amongst the young men of India,
Japan, & China, which I hope you
are following; and they have plenty
of men offering; it is mostly a
need of money - So drop a few
such hints in the wealthy "Old
Country" -
