Mrs. Terroux and myself were very glad to have had the Chinese guests with us, it helped greatly to enjoy the supper.




Re the Toc H Society, this was formed some two years ago and I know a Mr. Hamilton but do not know if this is the one connected with this Society.





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WHY WE SHOULD STUDY CHINESE PHILOSOPHY

A — Chinese Philosophy has the oldest foundation, the longest period of development, and the largest number of followers in the world.

B — Chinese Philosophy is little known to Westerners and has been omitted from their general plan of instruction. This is a great defect which should be corrected.

C — Chinese Philosophy is the source and essence of the religions, histories, governments, customs, sciences and arts of China and many other Eastern countries; without studying it, these things can never be thoroughly understood.

D — Chinese Philosophy provides a remedy for certain weak points and decadent tendencies in modern life.

E — Chinese Philosophy illustrates and explains the Oriental type of civilization, which is quite different from, but no less important than, the Occidental. Upon an increasing mutual comprehension of these two systems which complete each other, the betterment of the world depends.

F — Chinese Philosophy is simple, practical and closely related to every day life. The study of it is interesting and beneficial even to those who have no special acquaintance with Philosophy or Chinese subjects.
