He was certainly a great man, but here is all I can find at the moment about his contribution; to anatomy: "Lord Geddes", obit. by "J.C.B." in Journal of Anatomy, Camb. Univ. Press, vol. 88, pp. 428-%, July 1954:—

[tiples of the J., in J. A. War; M.B., Edin. with honours in 1905; demonstrator in anat. and after study abroad assistant to Prof. D. J. Cumningham. His light of paper, "Scheme for establishing a corps of voluntary officers", gave Haldane the idea of the O. T. C. and the name Territorial Force.

"In 1909 he was appointed Professor of Anatomy at the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland, and in 1913 left Dublin for the Chair of Anatomy at McGill University. During these years he was active in anatomical research and published a number of papers, most of them in this Journal between 1909 and 1913. The most notable, perhaps, were his 'Report upon an Acromegalic Skeleton' (J. Anat. 45, 256) based on his M.D. thesis for which he had been awarded a gold medal in 1903, 'The Origin of the Wirtebrate Limb' (J. Anat. 46, 350) and 'The Origin of the Osteoblast and the Osteoclast' (J. Anat. 47, 159). He had joined the Anatomical Society as its Summer Meeting in Edinburgh in 1907 and then contributed, with the late Professor David Waterston, some notes on 'The development of the Penguin'. This formed the basis of their later joint paper 'Report on the Anatomy and Embryology of Penguins collected by the Scottish National Antarctic Expedition' (Trans. Roy. Sec. Edinb., 1909)."

Dear Sir, Re: Sir William Osler Coats of Arms.

We have been in correspondence with Dr. A.W. Franklin of ll Wimpole Street, London W.l. with regard to the small Osler Coats of Arms, which have aroused a certain amount of interest in Canada and the United States of America. Dr. Franklin has advised us that 38 of these tiles are required by various private buyers in North America and that he would like us to contact yourself to arrange details for the execution of these orders.

You will appreciate that the peculiar circumstances of this business, originating from private as opposed to commercial parties, give rise to problems for our Company not customarily encountered. These are in the main problems of finance and distribution.

With regard to payment for the goods, we cannot, for obvious reasons, check on the credit worthiness of the individual buyers, nor draw commercial drafts on each individual. We therefore suggest that either payment be made before we commence production of the goods, or alternatively that the sale of the full quantity of tiles be made to two import houses, one in America and the other in Canada, to whom we can ship the goods and who will guarantee the business and attend to the import formalities and distribution of the tiles.

If your friends elect to prepay their orders and leave it to us to dispatch the tiles in individual boxes by parcel post, it will then be the responsibility of the buyers themselves to

pay the import duties to their postal authorities. We think we should mention at this stage that customs duty into both Canada and the U.S.A. is rather high on this class of merchandise. To the best of our information the U.S. Import Duty is 42% on our sale price, whilst for Canada there is an import duty of 15% plus a total of 20% for sales and excise tax.

Whilst our charge would be slightly higher for individual dispatch than for bulk shipment, we are of the opinion that in the long run it would be cheaper and more convenient after allowing for the handling and distribution charges, which would be involved in an ocean freight dispatch of the goods.

As you may know our ex-works price for these tiles is £3-5-0d. each, to which must be added packing, postage and insurance charges. We estimate that the final price to buyers after allowing for all charges including import dues will be in the region of £6-0-0d. each.

We therefore look forward to receiving your views and the decision of your friends in this matter so that we shall be able to quote a firm price for the orders of your friends according to the method of dispatch and payment selected.

From the Osler Library, To the Osler Family.

The Osler Club of London, England, has been authorized by the Historical Sites Commission to affix one of the latter's regulation plaques ("Sir Wm. Osler lived here") to his house, 13 Norham Gardens, Oxford. Let into the plaque is a small tile, 5 x 3 x 3/4 inches, reproducing in the proper colours the coat of arms granted in 1911 to him and to all the descendants of his father, the Rev. F. L. Osler. Three of these tiles have been made with all care and accuracy by the Royal Doulton Potteries, namely, for the site, the Club, and one which I have received for the Library. It does not bear the Osler name, only the arms, crest and motto AEQUANIMITAS. It weighs 12 ounces and, framed or unframed, makes a handsome and practical paper-weight.

The Potteries have offered to make additional copies at £3.5s. (about \$9) each, if we tell them how many will be required. I am sending this enquiry to the great-grandsons of F. L. O. and to some unrelated admirers of W. O. Please let me know as quickly as possible if any are wanted and by whom, but do not send me money. I don't know when they will be manufactured or to whom payment is to be made.
