Dear Dr. Rice,

In answer to your letter of the 16th inst., for which we are very grateful, I enclose an official list of 28 U.S. students (with their present addresses) who graduated here last June and will not receive copies of "aequanimitas" from Frosat & Co. Six of these (nos. 402, 427, 435, 437, 475, & 486) are still in Canada, interning in local hospitals. On account of bothersome customs formalities, &c., it might be advisable to defer sending them the book until they return to the U.S., probably next January.

This question wrises particularly in connection with next year's batch who will graduate, under the speeded-up plan, in January, 1943. They will all then be obliged, by a new regulation, to interne for 8 months in Canada, except the one or two from the States of Washington which requires its men to interne there. We shall be glad to send you a list of them with their hospital addresses in February. Then the best plan sight be for you to send each a letter, a sort of voucher, to the effect that he can obtain the book by applying to you when he returns to the U.S. The six 1942 graduates, might be dealt with in the same way.

That, I understand, is what Proset does with the Canadian students. They do not receive the book until they notify him that they have settled down to practise in Canada.

If the home addresses, which they give on registration, / for years before graduating, would be better for your purpose, se could let you have most of them.
