Dear Doctor Francis,

Dear Dr. Francis,

The circular concerning the Graduates' Society which you were good enough to send me was indeed of very special interest. In your letter you say that "Osler was the moving spirit in the revival of the Graduates' Society . . ". I think I may claim to be a follower of his in this regard!

For several years prior to 1908 the Graduates' Society had not held a single meeting; and, knowing something of the very great value of such organisations, when active, to the Universities with which they are connected in the United States, I thought it "foul shame" that we should be denied such benefit here, and decided to see what might be done in the way of organising an active movement by starting in a small way with the Graduates of the Faculty of Applied Science, of which I was one. In this endeavour I was later joined by Dr. Adams and Professor (afterwards Dean)

H. M. MacKay.

After much correspondence, preparation and verification of address lists, and other planning, a most successful four-day Reumion was held in connection with the Convocation in 1909; and at the Banquet I was appointed Secretary of the movement. There was no salary and there were no other officers: The publication of a "Bulletin" was started, and a copy of each number was sent to every Graduate of the Faculty, whether he paid the annual fee of two dollars or not. This publication ran from April 1909 to January 1919, seventeen numbers in all, totaling 1127 pages, at least one third of which consisted of class news. All the editorial work, as well as the Treasurer's duties, were carried on by the Honorary Secretary.

Naturally these doings became known to the Graduates of other Faculties, and many letters were received by the University, some of them rather indignant, asking why this activity was confined to one Faculty. The writers were informed that the University itself was doing nothing in the matter — that the movement was a purely private one. However, there was so much stir that the authorities felt obliged to do something, and there was planned and carried out the first General Reunion of McGill Graduates ever held. In connection with this event, the first and only tripartite (alphabetical, chronological, geographical) address list of Graduates issued by McGill was prepared in my office — and I had to raise \$500.00 before the University would print it!

Enough Life Members of the old Society were found to reconstitute it (I was one), and to take over from a firm of Accountants in the city something like seven thousand dollars which they had been holding for the organisation. A fegular staff of officers was elected and a full-time paid Secretary was appointed — and our Applied Science Graduates' movement was merged into this larger one.

So you see that I have been really interested in the success of the McGill Graduates' Society!!

Dear Dr. Ezell, esitate to let us seem at we can give you any forther It is so nice to hear from somebody who is interested in Dr. Thomas McCrae. We always feel as if he had been a member of Osler's family, as he was married to his niece Amy Gwyn. I am sure you have seen all the references to him and his wife in Cushing's "Life of Sir William Osler".

Among our accessions (loanable books added to the original collection), we have quite a few items relating to Dr. McCrae. The late Dr. Francis, who up till August, 1959, was the librarian here, had salvaged from the Montreal General Hospital quite a few books which had belonged to McCrae and had been sent there after Mrs. McCrae's death in 1939. The ones which Dr. Francis kept for this library were the interleaved (corrections and changes in McCrae's hand) copies of the Principles and Practice. 8th to 11th editions, which McCrae revised, and also the most interesting item, a note-book of McCrae's, which contains his notes taken at Osler's clinics, 1897-1904, with two inserted leaves of anecdotes concerning Osler. This book and any of the interleaved volumes of the Practice could be sent to you by registered mail. The other books, which included his diary on his trip abroad in 1899, were sent to McCrae's nephew, Dr. J. M. Kilgour, Winnipeg Clinic, St. Mary's and Vaughan Streets, Winnipeg, Man. Another item, the 7th edition, 1909, went to Dr. Kilgour's sister, Mrs. R. Gardner-Medwin, 16 Kirby Park, West Kirby, Cheshire, England. This copyk to quote Dr. Francis, "has a characteristic inscription, unsigned, but in Osler's hand, 'To the industrious hard-working underpaid junior editor from the idle, loafing overpaid senior editor, May 9, '09."

In the original Osler collection, e.g. all the books catalogued in the Bibliotheca Osleriana (a copy of this catalogue might be found in your Medical Library in Albany), there are many references to T.
