I have the comment that appeared in the New York Medical Journal in 1888 together with the copy of the clipping that had appeared in the Winnipeg Free Press, which was copied from the Minnedosa Tribune.

You remember George Blumer mentioned in his contribution to the Archives that he had seen in the Hopkins Hospital library the actual affidavits of the Manitoba train crew concerning the W.C. accouchement. That was, of course, some 50-odd years ago. I wrote to Dr. Blumer in California to see if he could help me locate those affidavits, but he tells me he knows nothing more about them and wonders whether W.O. recovered and took them with him when he left Baltimore.

I haven't written yet either to the Hospital or to the Welch Library and was wondering whether you might have any knowledge of the fate of those precious affidavits. Can you give me any suggestion to whom I might write to inquire?

Incidentally, I earmarked a copy of the University of Western Ontario Medical Journal containing my address at the banquet of the Osler Society last year to send to you and wonder if it ever reached you.

We are all glad that you are going to see Anne Wilkinson sometime soon. I have talked with her a good deal about writing up the four Osler brothers, and she has become much interested in that prospect.
