botallus, Botallo (or Botalli?), called in France Botal, seems to be a mess. His dates are unknown and 1530 is variously given as that of his birth, when he began his studies, and when he graduated from Pavia! Castiglioni in his recent History of medicine (p. 420) says the duct was named after him because he called the foremen ovale a duct, but I imagine C.'s wrong. Apparently B.'s books made the duct and toramen known, aspecially in France. The Franch still call the foremer trou de Botal, but the laster canal artiriel. His contesporaries, Vesalius and aranglo, are said to have described them before him, and so did Galen.

The best account I can find of him (and his works, unfortunately not available) is in Bezeimeris, "Dictionnaire" (\$6640). Part of the title of his "Comment arioli duo," Byons, 1565, is (translated) "A hitherto unknown channel is demonstrated by which the blood is carried into the left ventricle," and this was republished separately in 1640 and in his works, 1660. In this he is said to have claimed to be the discoverer of both foremen and duct.

He was an important man in his day, an interesting, and not always beneficial innevator, and he is worth looking into.
