I enclose the "Burns advise to the Student" MS, which you have kindly offered to examine and return to me. I am also enclosing a careful transcript which I have had made of it and which you may keep if you wish to have it. From the varied spelling of "honour", I am inclined to suspect that this MS was copied by an American from a British original, that is, copied by someone whose natural inclination was to spell -or but was careful to copy -our where he thought of it. I do not know when Americans adopted the short spelling, but I notice its use in a Philadelphia MS of 1802. Mr. Bryer, the student to whom it belongs, tells me that his aunt acquired it from an old lady some years ago, who thought it was a Burns autograph. She thinks the old lady inherited it from the last of three generations of physicians called Randall, all of whom graduated in Medicine at Yale, the first of the three early in the 19th century. I do not find any of them mentioned in American medical literature, nor any Burns of the period, but there were two famous Burns brothers, physicians in Glasgow, namely, John (1775-1850), and Alan, who died young, (1781-1813), and who was something of a genius with scientific ideas ahead of his time. Not much is known concerning the latter's life. I should like to be able to on one of h father the original with them if it ever could be done. CLEVELAND, Ohio Dear Sir: A fourth year medical student here, Mr. Bryer, has shown me a manuscript headed "Burns advise to a Student", which belongs to an aunt of his, who told him that it was in the autograph of Robert Burns. It is written on three pages of letter-paper, folio size, in a contemporary hand. but the writing is not sufficiently like that of the facsimiles in your excellent edition of the "Letters" to confirm her claim, and the wording of the heading is, of course, against the autograph theory. The matter is good advice in rather stilted language to a prospective medical student and must have been written, I think, by a medical man. It begins "Whoever aspires at eminence and respectability ... " I take the liberty of bothering you with this in the hope that in your researches you may have come across something similar and could possibly give me a clue to its real source.
