My dear Bill:

My dear Bill:

Your nice letter of the 16th has just arrived enclosing murderous looking envelopes annotated with your red ink and the post office red stamp "Returned for postage". Dear Dr. Fulton:

I find among my papers, your letter of October 16th which I have neglected to answer. I have been away much of the time since I received it and have postponed answering it because I hoped to have the time to blook up some of my records and give you some of the absolute facts. I have talked with Dr. Cushing on the subject a number of times and find his recollections of the facts differ from mine. He is quite right that the first tube with which we took any satisfactory X-rays was brought back by Dr. Warren, but we had taken X-rays of a sort here in America months before that with tubes which had no foci, but simply a wire anode and cathode. In fact, we produced Xerays with enough intensity to take shadows of coins from ordinary electric bulbs. I still have a good many of the old tubes which I designed before the focus tube which was brought home by Dr. Warren was discovered. If you are ever in Boston and are really interested in X-ray antiquities, I think you would be surprised at the early shapes of these tubes. As you may know, Professor Trowbridge in Cambridge took pictures of the human hand which were published in the papers here in Boston within a month after Roentgen's publication in December 1895. Francis Williams took the first medical X-rays in Boston and I think I took the first surgical ones.

So far as ether charts were concerned, this little research was pointed out to us by my chief, Dr. F. B. Harrington and any credit that the use of these charts entails, belongs to him rather than to me. He made the suggestion, I did the work. Cushing at once adopted it. Incidentally, I remember writing a paper on the use of ether at that time in which I made use of the findings compiled from these charts. It was a long, truthful paper and described in detail the various untoward things which had happened to patients as a result of anesthetization while I had been a house officer. The paper was never published because Dr. Warren said that it would not do to let the medical public know how much danger there was in giving ether! I am sorry I did not save that old paper :

It happens that just at present I have so many other things to do which should be done, that I cannot give the time to amusing recollections about those early days of the X-ray. I wish I could.

formerly of 75 Great Portland Street, W., and new of Church Hill, Mide.

The following list of 17th century sale catalogues is made up of two separate collections. One, containing thirty-nine catalogues bound in a single volume lettered Sale Catalogues London 1689-1690, was obtained November 21, 1928 from E.W.Bligh, a dealer in medical books formerly of 75 Great Portland Street, W., and now of Church Hill, Midhurst, Sussex. The first catalogue in this collection is that of Mr. Edward Larkin, and those bound with it are so indicated in the notes following individual entries. The collection apparently belonged at one time to the Medical Society of London, as the library stamp appears on the titlepage of the Larkin catalogue.

The second collection, ranging from 1682-1690/1, is in eight volumes bound in early 18th century panelled calf, each with the arms of 'Lord Viscount Courtenay'. This second collection was also obtained from E.W.Bligh in July, 1930. Their provenance is otherwise unknown. In the two collections there are seventy-five catalogues extending from 1682 to 1690/1. Of these thirty-six are mentioned in Lawler's Book Auctions in England in the Seventeenth Century. The others, chiefly anonymous, he does not list.

On an unnumbered page [30] of the catalogue of Walter Rea is the following interesting note, evidently by the bookseller William Coopers:

'To supply the vacancy of this page, and to gratifie the Curious, whose Genius may lead them to make perfect their Collection, I have caused to be Printed the Names of those Persons whose Libraries have been sold by Auction, and the series of the time when.

My dear Bill:

As usual, you have been kindness itself and I thoroughly approve and am infinitely grateful for all of the suggestions which you make on the Elizabethan Club ms. You have examined it with microscopic care and enriched it enormously. I am not quite sure what conventions one should adopt in transcribing Elizabethan texts; in general I followed your practice of underling contractions, but Tucker-Brooke assured me that I ought to observe 'u's' rather than to transliterate them as 'v's'. I see the weight, however, of your objection and I think it is wise. The reference to Elyot's prose as being "the most important link between English of the time of Chaucer and English of Francis Bacon" is paraphrased from Croft's [sic] "Life of Elyot" in his edition of The Gouvernour [sic]; in his rendering of Elyot's text he has adopted his spelling throughout, 'u's' and all. I felt, in the circumstances, that it was best to follow that precedent.

With regard to your Rabelaisian question, I will send you Nivernoys and Mollet under separate cover to inspect and return [sic]! Your comments about Rabelais are most helpful. Try secretary did this !!

I saw W.O.'s copy of Napier's Logarithms, 1614, with a long note in W.O.'s handwriting. It is still preserved at the Library of the Elizabethan Club and apparently much treasured. I have not, however, seen the ms. of Burton - I shall find out where it is, the next time I am there. I was glad to have your notation concerning 'contubernium', and I was relieved that it implied a dwelling-together, or co-habitation in the un-legal, un-quasi marital sense.

That nice fellow, Larkey, and his attractive wife appeared in New Haven last night. He, as you know, is Professor of Medical History out at the University of California and is really magnificently fitted (gloriose imbutus) for the post. He is an M.D. and spent four years at Oxford in the 'English Schools'. He is now on his way abroad to buy some books for their medical library. Francis Osler Library McGill University Montreal, Canada My dear Bill: What a marvelous man you are! Your reading of the proofs of my bibliography of Boyle places me eternally in your debt. You have seen things that no other born mortal would ever have seen, and you day have collected errors that, had they appeared, would have glared at every one and overwhelmed me with humiliation. The blunder in No. 103 fills my soul with terror. When I wrote you on the 4th I was mystified by your casual reference and missed the point of it entirely. You are quite right in assigning the fragment to the 'Effluviums'. If you doubt my sanity altogether (you have every reason to doubt my Latinity) perhaps I could explain that these two little Bologna editions, which I never heard of before, arrived a few days before we left Oxford and Hill and I renumbered all the cards on account of them (for about the tenth time:). Your various comments about signatures and contents make me wish that I had had the backbone to stand up against Gibson and Hill in giving everything by signatures. For every entry on all the cards I had given both pagination and signatures, and Gibson said that this was entirely contrary to the regulations of the Bibliographical Society and that they could not well print it if I insisted. I did insist, however, only to reach a compromise of giving unnumbered pages by signatures and numbered pages by the 17th century printers' erratic enumeration. I am most unhappy about it because in revising the cards many of the blank leaves, previously indicated by signatures, were struck out by Gibson and Hill after I had left Oxford. I am not turning my back on all the services that they have rendered, for they revised all of the cards, making many corrections, but in so doing they could not restrain their enthusiasm for Bodleian conventions. I shall transfer the majority of your corrections on to my final copy and send your queries, most of which are the outcome of Bodleian "simplifications", to Hill for settlement before the proofs go in. 5 Mpris solly I am glad you raised the question about the Geneva editions. They were, are, and will continue to be the bane of my existence. New issues keep turning up with cancelled title-pages and bearing odd dates. I have dealt with them briefly among the collected editions which you will find enclosed with this letter. All the galleys have now come through, and I am able to see the whole thing more or less in perspective.

ÈMILE HILAIRE AMAGAT was born on the 2d of January, 1841, at St. Satur, a village in the arrondissement de Sancerre, in the Département du Cher. It was at first his intention to be a technical chemist, but he abandoned this career almost at the very outset in preference of one in pure science.

For several years Amagat was préparateur of the celebrated Berthelot at the Collège de France. After this (between 1867 and 1872) he was called to Switzerland, where he served as professor at the Lycée de Fribourg. It was there that Amagat completed his thèse de doctorat, being formally honored with this degree in Paris in 1872.

Returning to France, he was successively made professor at the Lycée d'Alencon, à l'École Normale Spéciale de Cluny, and in 1877 was appointed professor of physics in the Faculté Libre des Sciences of Lyons. In this institution, then merging into active existence, he created the department of physics, and in it conducted his most famous researches.

He left Lyons in 1891 for Paris, where he resides at present in the official position of examinateur à l'École Polytechnique.

Amagat has been correspondent of the Institut de France (Académie des Sciences, Section de Physique) since 1889. He was elected a foreign member of the Royal Society of London in 1897, and of the Royal Society of Edinburgh in the same year. He is honorary member of the Societé Hollandaise des Sciences, of the Société Scientifique de Bruxelles, of the Philosophical Society of Manchester, etc. etc.

Dear John:

I am sending back the Boyle proofs (sheets 1-80, up to no. 218) by this or the next mail, under separate cover. Please don't be alarmed at the amount of red ink I've put on them. It is largely suggestions, counsels of perfection, which you may, but I hope won't quite, ignore.

BUT you must deal with no. 103. I like the cool remark in yours of the 4th, 'I hope you have straightened out the difficulty with Nos. 103 and 109' !! I'll put it here in type, in case my writing is legible. It is the only bad slip; and I beseach you to focus your Latinity (it needn't be Magdalenian) on the title printed under 103. It is evidently 'Fire and Flame ponderable' and has nothing to do with 'Relation betwint Flame and Air', but is part of 'Effluviums', the very edition of which you under 109, where it belongs, that 'No copy has yet come to light':

While we are dis-cussing that same ruddy sheet 46, let me transcribe here what I have written in the upper right corner of it with reference to the end of your Note to no. 101: 'Your memory fails you. Our copy, Bibl. Osler. 7679, which you not only saw but gave to us and helped me to collect, has k-x before K2, in the original binding. See the entry in the Addenda of the Catal. The collation is there, in black & white, with you as donor, so you must note the exception here.'

A few general criticisms, especially concerning the earlier entries: In the collations the number of leaves plus pp. does not always correspond to the sigs., and sometimes you give only the faulty, not the real, number of pp.

In the <u>Contents</u>, when the pagination is, as usual, erratic, sigs. as well as pp. are almost necessary. Also <u>every page</u> should be accounted for. In nearly every description you seem to ignore blank pages, and the reader is left to wonder whether it is safe to assume such a page to be blank, or whether it has been overlooked. Even versos of titles, or at least sub-titles, should be mentioned.

However, I have carefully compared all the 18 Boyle editions here with your descriptions (Nos. 15, 18, 26, 30, 44, 50, 57, 58, 71, 101, 116, 146, 159, 166, 180, 189, 194 & 197) and I must confess that I have found only one of your unmentioned versos (No. 26, p. [42]) to contain print - in this case an 'Advertisement'. It may well be blank in your copy, but how is one to know?

Your very scanty treatment of the many 1680 Colonia Allobrogum editions mystifies me (Nos. 24, 32, 63, 76, 90, 95, 100, 112, 121). If they really are new printings, why no collation, contents, &c.? The Genevan printers, by the way, used that old Roman imprint for export, especially to Catholic markets, where it savoured less of heresy than the name 'Geneva':

So much for criticism, which was your object in sending me the proofs. There is really much more to praise. It is a tremendous piece of labour, which needed doing, and you've done it splendidly. How the deuce you've managed it, with all the other things you've been doing meanwhile. I can't understand. Your Preface and your introductions to the various works supply exactly the right amount of bio- to leaven, a la Osler, the biblio-graphy, and give one an appreciation of Boyle that is not, I think, to behad from his biographies. And John Beattie, to whom I lent the proofs yesterday, agrees. He is back at work, with his fractured thigh in a splint.
