My dear Bill:

I sent you the first three chapters Friday without a covering note. I do not have duplicate copies of all the illustrations, but I included a scattering to give you an idea of what they are like.

I am struggling at the moment over the final chapter and I need your guidance on several points. I had always been surprised that H.C., who was such an ardent exponent, failed to mention anything about Sir William's autopsy in the Biography. Was this out of deference to Lady O.?

I intend to have a brief paragraph about H.C.'s autopsy unless for any reason you think it would be unwise to do so. It seems to me a wonderful opportunity of putting before the lay public the importance of such things.

The other question is again one of taste. What do biographers ordinarily do about wills? H.C.'s will is really an extraordinary document, and although I am mentioned in it several times I am eager to have at least part of it on record because of the outline which he gives of his plan for the Historical Library and a Chair of the History of Medicine. If I were not mentioned in it, I would have no hesitation in publishing it in toto as an appendix. As Mr. Lowell used to say, you see my embarrassment.

I believe that you have now seen Chapters I through V, VII, and IX. The revised version of VI is not yet ready, but I enclose VIII, X, and XI.au the revised of VI


Dear Dr. Bill:
