My dear Harvey:

I don't think you need worry about the inscription. Anyway I had enough confidence in the correctness of your quotation to use it in the enclosed, which your paper inspired and which I expect I neglected to send you before.

Also don't worry about the "obituary". You have two living companions on the wall. The entrance hall of the new Neurological Institute is about 30 X 20 feet, in the chaste modern style, walls tinted brown. Opposite the entrance is a replica of a French statue (in the Pasteur Institute ?) of "Nature revealing herself to Science" (also chaste). It is a sort of Hall of Fame, having the names of fourteen famous neurologists on the wall just below the ceiling, namely, Horsley, Jackson, Sherrington, Golgi, Ramon y Cajal, Pavlov, Weir Mitchell, Charcot, Bernard, Harvey Cushing, Frb, Nissl-Alzheimer, and one other whose name I forget. Your name is on the left as one enters, over the entrance to the corridor. The ceiling of the room is ingenious and striking. It is covered with paintings of various types of nerve cells on a shedowy background of a magnified network of capillaries. In the centre there is a large medallion consisting of a ram's head, which was the architect's suggestion as a substitute for the first proposal, namely, Christopher Wren's drawing of the base of the brain showing the Circle of Willis, which seemed too grossly anatomical. The ram Aries of course signifies the astrological head and brain. Around Aries are the four Egyptian hieroglyphics which stand for the brain in the Edwin Smith papyrus (my suggestion) and around that again is a motto is the Greek sentence which I dustout of Galen, where he is commenting on an aphorism of Hippocrates to the effect that wounds of the brain are always fatal, and says, "But I have seen a severely injured brain heal". I hope you will approve of the whole scheme when you see it next month. If you do not, you can repudiate your name by maintaining that it is that of some Slavic colleague, because it is spelled in classical capitals, CVSHING!. The Institute is a fine building about eight stories high, with wards and everything. It is to take care of the entire neurological and neuropathological interests but not psychology or psychiatry. Living or dead, certainly your name could not have been left out of it - "the very stones would cry out". Without you and your work it would not be there, as you and everybodyelse know.

I have just had a nice letter from Klabs, who is sending me for the Library his copy of the Parisano Harvey, which the Chief did not have. He is also going to send me that nice gargoyle portrait of you in the Alps contemplating the abyss.

I hope you are keeping well and that the "provocative" address which you are busy on is intended to be delivered to us here next month.

Dear Bill:

Thanks hugely for your letter telling me about the Welch inscription which is a great comfort. I tackled the professor of Latin here the other night and he said in effect what you have written, though I doubt if he is as good a Latin scholar as you are. Your paper on Dr. Welch is simply A-1, like everything else you do. The story about Mr. X. and the introduction to the translation of Billroth is excellent, just as are all the other amusing stories with which you have peppered your brief note. It's nice of you to have called attention to my short skit.

Thanks, too, for the information about the entrance hall of the neurological institute in whose symbolical decorations I gather that you have had a leading hand. I have been trying to outline my thirty-minute paper and hope I can make some sort of fist of it, though I really don't quite know what there is to say except that here is a new opportunity to push along neurology under favourable circumstances. Neurology has always been a sort of Cinderella of Medicine and rather neglected.

I am telling the story of our effort after the War to start a Neurological Institute in Washington to take care of the veterans with disabled nervous systems. We went to the Rockefeller Institute about it and Popsy was very much interested. I think we might have pulled it off had it not been that Mr. X. (in this case Simon) objected by saying that the laboratory investigations we proposed to carry out on encephalitis and other subjects could better be done in the Rockefeller Institute. I have an idea that all this may have simmered in the minds of certain of the Foundation people and that it may have been the seed out of which this Montreal institute has come into being.

The last three manuscript entries overflow on to the back of xxxv. Opposite Garrod's name, #150, the entry reads "Lost 2 sons in war"; I believe it turned out to be 3, did it not?

This is all that your letter seems to call for, though I am a little doubtful as to what you mean by "What it may contain". There is an enormous amount of material inserted in the volume, mostly related to blackballing. namely in order: W.O.'s manuscript record of the votes obtained - about 40 candidates on Oct. 30, 1910; another list of candidates undated; a letter from Savage. Nov. 30, 1904, asking if he may put up W.O.'s name for membership; an undated extract from the Pall Mall Gazette about blackballing and the ethics of King Edward's resignation from his club when they turned down one of his friends; at the end on a fly-leaf a whole page of W.O.'s indignant notes about various election meetings 1910-12, when they found it impossible to elect anybody on account of the obstructionist tactics of "Polonius" and "Hibernicus". Inserted: W.O.'s detailed list of votes obtained by another 40 candidates on Oct. 30, 1911; a letter from Sir Humphry Rolleston, 30 March, 1918, about a college (not a club) election; a printed slip of the Club Rules, practically the same as those printed on p. xxxvii; and a notification of a dinner 15 Nov., 1913. I hope you don't want all these, not that it would be too much trouble, by any means, to give them to you, but I think most of the blackball notes ought to be treated as confidential, at any rate during the life time of the unsuccessful candidates.
