Mott and MacDougall would be an excellent choice from England, the latter is first class, M. also. When do you suppose the Clinic will be ready for opening? I am going out at the end of September to give some lectures at Yale and shall be at the Hopkins for a week some time in October.

About Cushing, I do not think he could at any time have well refused the Harvard position. It will be a great loss to Baltimore, and it is hard to say where you are to turn for his successor.

Are you going back by way of England? If so we should be delighted to see you.
