Dear Blackader

What a tragedy to part with that splendid son: We are all heartbroken about it. He stood the illness so bravely; not a word of complaint. The complication began with a septic pleurisy & pericarditis - then there were signs of involvment of the lung, foetid sputa &, so Armour opened the pleura which was adherent & opened a big sloughing and gangrenous abscess in the lung. He seemed doing well & last week I was very encouraged. I saw him every day, till the 6th. Then Monday & Tuesday they phoned that he seemed doing well. Yesterday I went up to find that at 1. he had had a profuse haemorrhage from the wound, & at the dressing a big bit of grangrenous lung came away. Last night at 1130 he seemed better - quite clear in his mind & pulse stronger. This morning at 920 he was taking a few spoonsful of porridge from his wife when he suddenly began to breathe quickly, (I came in at that moment.) turned a livid grey, pulse uncountable & then quickly became unconscious and he died in about twenty minutes. So fortunate that his wife had come. Poor dear: she has been so brave, thro it all. It is a terrible calamity for you all & you & Mrs Blackader have our heart-felt sympathy.
