I give and bequeath unto my beloved son
Thomas Dames, the sum of five hundred

I give and bequeath unto my beloved son

Son James Pawley Dawes, a like sum of
Hundred

I Give and Bequeath unto my beloved Son
Audrey Dawes a like sum of Hundred

And all the rest residue and remainder
of my Property moveable and immovable
Real and Personal Plate and plated ware
debts and actions whatsoever, Wheresoever the
same may be situated, and to what amount
the same shall come, to me in amuse belonging
or appertaining or in which I may have and
right interest and share at the day of my death
Without any exception or reserve, I Give devise
and Bequeath unto my beloved Husband
James Pawley Dawes to be used enforfed
and disposed of by him as he may think
proper hereby instituting my said beloved
husband James Pawley Dawes my universal
legatee in full Property.

It is my will and desire that my said beloved
husband shall pay the special legacies hereinbefore
bequeathed unto our beloved children as they
respectively attain the age of majority and
should any of my children die before attaining
the age of majority, the share of the Party so dying
shall rest in and be the property of the survivors
or survivor of them, and should all the said
children die before attaining the age of majority
then and in that case, the said several special
legacies shall esue to and become the property
of my said beloved husband James Pawley Dawes
to whom I accordingly bequeath the same,

I Appoint my said beloved Husband James
Pawley Dawes and my Brother in law Thomas
Amos

Amos Dames, executors of this my last will
and testament unto whose hands I do hereby chuse
myself of all my probate according to law, and
I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disannul
all and ever other former testaments till legacies
bequests and executors by me in any ways before
named settled and bequeathed, disfiguring this
and no other to be my last will and testament

The present last will and testament
was thus made dictated and nominated
