Mrs Stewart
22 Sep 1857

St. John. Sept. 22. /57

My Dear Uncle

After having reached
St. John in safety. I now take up
my pen to address you a few lines
to let you know how things have
gone with me since last writing you

Mr. Stewart did not reach
Picton quite so soon as he at
first expected. He reached Picton on
Thursday evening, and after seeing him
and making some arrangements
we agreed to the Ceremony taking
Place on the Tuesday after

Which it accordingly did we had
quite a fine day and every thing
passed off well. You will get all
the particulars from Mrs. Dawson.

I certainly cannot feel too
grateful to the Providence which
has given to me one of the

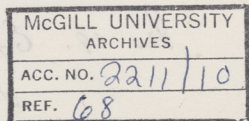
kindest and best of. Husbands in
all his conduct towards me he is most
felling kind and affectionate

I have not seen round the place
much yet as I will be obliged
to remain in for a week or two
to receive visitors but from what I
can see I think there is little
doubt but that I will like it yet

Mr. Stewart has just got the
Sepell which he launched way to
Liverpool the Trade is rather dull in
their way. just now I believe they
intend doing very little until they see
how things may turn with them

I have not yet been to Church
as it was on Sabbath morning when
we reached. St. John. there was
some delay on the Road owing to
the Coach breaking down. There
is quite a number of Parties

who go on to the States and
St. John come by the Steamer
but as the wind was high on the
day on which we left. Mr Stewart
thought that it would be much
pleasanter to go by the Western Coach
it makes just as comfortable as
any, coming by that way as we
had a Covered Coach all the way
I should like very much
to hear how you are I saw
Mrs. Johnston's daughter before leaving
Picton they had received a letter
from you ^{and Johnston}! was sorry to hear
by both ^{Mrs} of them that you still
found your Leg troublesome. But
afterwards on seeing Mr Bays
who told me that he had also
received a letter from you
in which you had spoken of



yourself as improving considerably
which I hope you continue to do

I seen here Mr. B. Sutherland
who is now living here he was asking
very kindly about you. I am under
the imprefion that he is not doing
much his son is a Clerk in the City

I have found some very kind
pleasant. People who have been calling on
us but still what a pleasure it would
be to me that of having you near us
so that we could see each other occasionally
but I hope you are happy and like
Montreal very much I know that being
with the Children is what I have always
thought would be a real pleasure to you
I will now finish these scribbling lines
with the hope that I may shortly here
from you which would be a real comfort
to me Mr. Stewart goes with me
in love to you
