Dear Sir.

We have rec^d your favor 18th ult^o and apologise for being so long of writing to you. We enclose mem^o of ac^t in which you will notice a charge of 1/2 poor rates on a lot said to be owned by Millians at the West End of the town and an ac^t of the 20th 18⁴⁴ paid McPherson to which we enclose - We have not rec^d any rent from Glover for some time but have been sending some of our people to him for tailoring and he will have an acct against us which he understands is to go for rent. Mitchell McKenzie is also in arrears but her brother have been idle during winter - they have now got work and will pay up soon. Collins has also been idle - we hope in Spring to get this also.

Respecting the lot at East River - we have no wish for it at all - it may become valuable but the length of time it has laid over without becoming so would not warrant us in offering a large price for it as a speculation

As regards Lloyd's Agency - up to Janry
1859 it yielded us 30% last year it
yielded to 40% for surveys &c. That
is the result so far - we thank you
for your hints about the Halifax
Office and will avail ourselves of
them but as yet they have had
nothing to do in this quarter.

You were good enough to
recommend us for this Agency &
we would but ill requite your
kindness in this respect were we
to make you a charge for the little
attention we have been happy to
pay to your business here - Consider
that settled - we have no charge
to make. We shall be most
happy to see William but regret
poor Georges illness renders this
necessary. We shall attend to
collection and remittance of
Cresan note when it becomes due.

The success of the Grand
Trunk - so unexpected and so promising
must be gratifying to every well wisher
of the N. A. Colonies. We hope that it will
be sufficient Encouragement to the
British Government to afford material
aid in continuing the line to H -
