Dear Sir,

On reference to our ledger we find the last  $\frac{1}{2}$  rendered July 1858 and we had on hand at that date the following.

- 56 Copies Harmonicam
- 12 " " "  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cf
- 20 " " Geology
- 4 " " Maps on Rollen.

Previous to the fire we noticed two copies of the Geology on the shelf in the upper room, and at the same time we had some on the shelves in our shop, all that we up stairs was destroyed and we think if we allow seven copies as sold it will be fair, the remaining three copies we may put down as destroyed. We never sold a copy of the Harmonicam  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cf. they were in the upper room and all destroyed, at the time we sent you your last  $\frac{1}{2}$  we put away in the upper room 54 Copies of the Harmonicam and brought into the shop 12 Copies for retail, we do not recollect of selling any but as we

have now on hand six copies, we will allow three as having been sold the other three are put down as lost. The maps on Gollen were in our office, these had been more sold, they with a lot of other goods were taken over to Mr Roman's house and all burnt. The foregoing statement we think is correct to the best of our knowledge, and we therefore beg to enclose an ac in accordance with it showing a balance in your favor of £            which we will remit to Mr Primrose. The six copies of the Harmonican we will send to Mr Primrose if you desire us to do so, this will close all accounts between us.

We feel obliged to you for your consideration and trust the statement will be satisfactory under the circumstances.
