(which were taken 9 days ago)
to my family in Winnipeg.
You have seen the baby so

to send them over to you however
and I will send them another
set when I get more printed.
Lois got up for the first

time on Thursday last when she slipped out of bed into a chair. On Friday she took a couple of steps to chair. On Saturday she welcomed me from the window-sill at lunch time. Sunday - walked down the hall and also into Miss Sare's room. Monday - down-stairs for the first time for lunch and today she has had a fine day - down stairs from 11 o'clock until a quarter to nine this evening. Her colour is good today and I believe she is looking finer than I have ever seen her

before. She ⁴⁰ has not thought
of a thing yet in connection
with the household and at
the end of the day she appears
perfectly fresh and bright.

In a day or two we will take
her out for a quiet drive and
then she will have little strolls
to the corner and back until the
end of the week.

When Ted gets to Winnipeg I hope
you will help each other. I wonder
if it will occur to him that Ruth
might like him to keep a good
many things that she liked. I
rather hope it does occur to him.
