My dearest Lois

I arrived comfortably yesterday morning and immediately went up to Tim's and had breakfast. Nicholas had got away a day or so before because they were reading their first letter from him written from camp and were of course delighted. I found them both well and extremely pleased with Margaret for helping them out by looking after Sheila. Our house had been very nicely tidied and I complimented Margaret for her good work. Tim drove me to the office, where I did just a moderate days work, most of my time being consumed looking after Mr + Mrs Traver and their son Leonard 14 years of age - all of whom had motored down from Timmins on their vacation. I took them to lunch at the University Club where, to my surprise I found on the register "K.M. Winslow - lunch - introduced by Terene Winslow". I chased Ken up to the dining room and he admitted that he had evaded me because he was on his vacation. However I got him for an hour in the afternoon and had dinner with him at Mother's apartment in the evening after we had vainly tried to induce Terene and Mary to have dinner with us at the St James Club. Mary was very disappointed because she could not persuade her guests the Outerbridges to forsake the Shephards pie at Mary's and come down and get a St James Club meal. You can imagine that Mary's maid was also somewhat disappointed. (over)

who is a grass widower and returned to Montreal on the
4³⁰ (daylight time) train. I tried to get hold of Ken but
was unsuccessful. Had dinner alone - came down town
intending to go to the pictures but they are all jammed
so I came here to see if there was a letter from you
and was rewarded by finding yours of Tuesday. I am
glad you have seen Mother. I hope you will make a
point of spending some time with her. If you get a warm
day she would love to sit with you on our beach.
You will see from my description that I have not
yet had much time to be really lonely, although it
will not be particularly wonderful going up to the empty
house which I must do by horrible street car in a few
minutes.

Please send me the contents of my golf suit waistcoat/pockets
including my fountain pen (empty of ink please) my little
vest pocket note book and any other trifles you may find.

I cannot write with this pin pointed pen.

Well dear do lots of things away from the house and
neglect your house keeping all possible. Play golf, tennis
dance, fish and entertain visitors and don't give all
your time to the relations and the children. I hope you have
good weather. My best love to you sweetheart and to all
the children.
