My dear Darwin


I heard of you not long ago from Sir Edmund Head  
who told me that no one could possibly be getting on  
better or giving them all greater satisfaction than you.  
I had hoped before this to send you a Supplement to  
my 5<sup>th</sup> Ed<sup>n</sup> of the Manual, that you might learn how we  
have just found a dozen new mammalia, insectivorous  
& herbivorous in the Upper Oolite or Middle Purbeck, &  
Angiosperms in the Coal, Antholites of Lindley, &  
many other points some bearing on Tertiary, some on  
Silurian Geology. But the printers have delayed  
& it may be a week before I get separate copies  
to distribute.

I wish you could find some of these antholites. Now  
that Hooker has seen better specimens than those which I  
figured at p. 374 last (5<sup>th</sup>) Ed. of Manual, he acknowledges  
that they are angiosperms, & the Colebrook Dale species  
different from that of Newcastle. Perhaps after all  
the Sigillaria swamps or their borders were cultivated  
by flowers, & as we have already from Treves or  
Saarbruck many orders of insects, Orthoptera  
Neuroptera, Coleoptera, why may not butterflies have  
sucked these flowers.

Think of 37 mammalian jaws from the Oolite all  
found since 10<sup>th</sup> of Dec! Is it not alarming to  
"finality" men. Still I wonder that Sir W. Logan  
has not turned out a fish out of the Silurian.

Weyman tells me he has received (& he has  
sent me two drawings of) two genera of reptiles  
from the Ohio Coal.

If the Germans, French, Spaniards, Italians would only  
match the Anglo-Saxons, we should soon turn  
out in Europe a better stock of air-breathers & highly  
organized plants of the older time. Think of  
one



one Pupa standing alone!

The Dryopithecus of the palanian, or Miocene of S. of France, nearer to Man in many points than the Chimpanzee, is making people think that somewhat greater allowance ought to be made for our ignorance.

What may we not find anywhere is the question which many ask.

I have a great deal of work in prospect in Europe. The Supplement will show you I am not idle, but I have been chiefly working at Volcanos of Madeira &c. I hope you & your family are all well. My wife has the Mayflower in her room which Mr Dawson made for her.
