My Dear Sir

I have your two  
letters one after 31<sup>st</sup> Aug: the  
other after 1<sup>st</sup> Oct. - I had  
hard to see you as I had  
through Montreal first  
evening on my way to the  
place where I leave today  
on a hasty excursion to  
Westington: - I wanted I  
still want to talk to you

our letters of the 31<sup>st</sup> for I  
wrote you for Ottawa that  
day I hope Decker will  
see you and that you  
will learn from his explana-  
tion the precise history of the  
appointment from appointment  
to the Council of Instruction

I doubt as he goes so  
soon - and I do not see  
the possibility of finishing  
any day before next month  
I shall be absent in  
Washington about a  
week and will try to see  
you on my way from  
the place back to the river
