My dear Dr Dawson

Yours of July 3 found me
very busy preparing for the British Association,
and with no more leisure than just to allow
me to send you copies of such Revue Carson
papers as I had by me, (and appeared to be
not in your possession). I trust they reached
you safely. I was much taken, at first,
by your suggestion respecting the Chronological
value of the weight of fallen stones, but soon
saw, to add that this feeling was not
prominent. On thinking the matter over,
I found reason to doubt whether the fall of
stones had been anything like regular. But
worse, perhaps, than this, is the fact that many
of the stones are very many times in weight
as that not infrequently the same mass
projects from the greatest Vertical Depth in
the case - south, through the ^{State} ~~land~~ and
the Black Mountains.
