I thank you for your kind letter giving the only detailed account which I had received of the last hours of poor Mr Miller. He had long been a consistent Christian, & the fortitude & faith regarding himself, which you describe, are just what I would have expected.

I agree with you in thinking that Stimulants would only have protracted his sufferings. That he was struck on the breast, as well as legs, seems clear from the fact, that his ~~right~~ ^{left} leg was considerably swelled.

The family are left quite destitute, & your kind offer to contribute \$5 is thankfully appreciated.
