“ PHILIP SCHAFF, D. D., in Biblical Literature, with Rev. CHARLES A. BRIGGS as his Assistant in Hebrew and Greek.

“ GEO. L. PRENTISS, D. D., in Pastoral Theology, Church Polity and Mission Work.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

A course of Six Lectures will be delivered on the MORSE Lectureship, by J. W. DAWSON, LL.D., of McGill College, Montreal, upon the “Relations of the Bible to the Sciences.”

Lectures on Hygiene by WILLARD PARKER, M. D., LL. D., and by D. TILDEN BROWN, M. D., on the “Relations of Morbid Conditions of Body and Mind to Religious Experience.”

Lectures will be given by HON. WILLIAM STRONG, Justice of the United States Supreme Court, on the “Relation of Civil Law to Ecclesiastical Polity, Discipline and Property.”

PRIZE FELLOWSHIP.

For the purpose of encouraging special merit, and with a view to training a corps of teachers in our Theological Seminaries, that student (beginning with the class which enters September, 1874) who, at the completion of his full Seminary course shall have made, in the judgment of the Faculty, the greatest proficiency in the original languages of the Bible, and in general Biblical scholarship, shall be elected as Fellow, with the privilege of spending two years in the Universities of Europe, and in the lands of the Bible, receiving an annual appropriation of \$700.

PECUNIARY ASSISTANCE.

Students whose circumstances require it—not provided for by the usual appropriations of Education Boards and Societies—may receive aid from the Seminary Scholarship Fund, which now exceeds fifty thousand dollars.

ROOMS

Are furnished gratuitously to the students in the Seminary building and adjacent houses.

BOARD

Can be obtained in private families for \$5 per week.

SELF-SUPPORT.

While the city affords facilities for such as wish to earn the means of supporting themselves, by teaching and by various forms of church work, it must be distinctly understood that no arrangements will be allowed by the Faculty which interfere with the paramount appointments of the Seminary.

CHURCH RELATIONS.

While it is expected that the students will be regular in their attendance on public worship in connection with some church and pastor; and while the ecclesiastical bodies in New York and vicinity are ready, when desired, to examine students for licensure at the proper time, the members of this Seminary are advised not to disconnect themselves from the several churches and Presbyteries from which they come.
