Dear Sir,

I was much gratified
yesterday by the receipt of
your post card of the 22nd
ult. and of the accompanying
Report on the Lower Carboni-
ferous plants of Canada.

The term "Tuedian" is likely,
I think, to be very generally
adopted for the English
representatives of the Horton
Series. In Scotland however

I fear that it will not prevail.

Your ~~list~~ list of equivalents is of the greatest interest to me as I am about publishing a "Nomenclator stratigraphicus" or list of stratigraphical names with equivalency, author, date, &c. a work which I have been engaged on for some years and which seems to increase in difficulty as it approaches completion. I observe that you regard the Culm & Culm Graywacke

of Germany as the continental equivalents of the Tuedians. This is a step much in advance of anything which has been done here in the way of Carboniferous correlation since the days of Jukes. There will be however much difficulty I fancy in establishing the point in the face of much palaeontological evidence pointing ~~the~~ ⁱⁿ this way, but I believe you, nevertheless, to be right.

I take the liberty of
