with care,

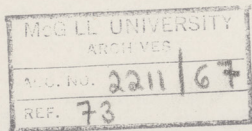
They are sufficient
to indicate the probability of
valuable deposits both
of iron and copper on
the property, but not
sufficiently definite as
to the magnitude of
the deposits and the
precise quality of the ores.

In settle these points,
a competent Mining engineer
should be sent with
a party of men, to
select the most promising
place or places, to
open up the deposits,
& estimate the average
production and cost
of extraction, and to
make a map of the
ores. It would be

desirable in the case
of the Row One, that
a small engine should
be extracted, sufficient
& enable practical
trials to be made.

All this, with the
exception of the apays
to be made here, could
be done in a few
weeks.
