Chester, Penna. Feb. 11 1886.

My dear Sir;

Yours of the 7th came last night; I am very glad to hear from you on the points suggested.

1. Mrs. Weston begs me to say that if Mrs. Dawson will kindly accept our hospitalities, she will greatly add to the pleasure with which we anticipate your visit. We are three quarters of an hour from Phila. and she can go into the city & come out whenever she chooses.

2. Chester is 14 miles from Phila. on the Phila. Wilm. & Baltimore Rail Road. Your best way here will be to buy a ticket to New York. In New York, buy a ticket for Chester, and be particular to get into a Baltimore car. Some of the cars in the train stop at Phila. but the Baltimore car come through and by taking the right car you will avoid the trouble of changing. There are four or five through trains in the day time and any of them, except the "Limited Express" will stop at Chester on a New York ticket.

3. The audience will probably be a mixed one — theological students & ministers forming the larger portion. We are building a hall which we expected to have ready for occupancy by the first of May.

but the unprecedentedly cold weather has so hindered the workmen, that I fear it will not be completed in time to have you dedicate it. I am not quite sure but we may conclude to have the lectures given in Philadelphia. If we do, you will probably have a somewhat promiscuous audience, but largely composed of thoughtful and educated persons.

As to the times of delivery we will consult your wishes. If you have no objection I should now say we will have one every day - in the day time - if in Phila. at noon - and in any event not in a church.

4. We have between 20 & 30 trains a day to Phila. - the fares are low (25 cents) - the time 30 minutes on the fast trains and 45 minutes on the slow trains.

These answers are not all of them as definite as I should like, but before the first of May we shall come to more exact conclusions. Meanwhile I shall be happy to give any information in my power on points of interest that may occur to you.
