My dear Doctor

The Laval Bill will, to all appearances, pass the Legislature and become law; but I very much question whether it will not be disallowed at Ottawa.

I tried the other evening while the House was in Committee of the whole on the Bar Bill to introduce an amendment, that the holders of degrees from British or Canadian Universities should not be compelled to undergo an examination before being admitted to study, but I was defeated.
