below on Cambrian - Below these  
the red felsites may very well  
come - but not below the Mer -  
Do not allude to Hicks' Aronson -  
It has no real existence - In Angley  
it means intrusive felsites and  
crushed up gneiss or schists -  
In Llanarmonston lower flows which  
maybe just as well remain in the  
Petridian - As to David's rocks  
whose geological position is not  
clearly defined, but which  
probably belong to the Petridian.
