Dear Mr. William Dawton

Many thanks for your letter
I am very glad to have received
them but we left England
a month ago and have been
walking in the keen air
& lovely scenery of this part of
the way valley ever since
We are 6400 feet above the
sea in the middle of our

amphitheater of snow peaks
of 11-12000 feet. and glaciers
hanging on all sides - I have
forgoten the existence of my liver
and find I can manage an
eighteen mile walk as well
as I ever did -

I found my President's hills
at Liverpool the hardest
week's work I ever had
in my life - I trust

that Birmingham will let
you off very easily at any
rate in the matter of dinners
and speeches — and that
the receipts from the Association
may be better with all the
wear & tear than it has
been in later years.

When they return I had proposed
in the address of the Royal Society
I trust that the meeting together
of the two nations English speaking
men of science may be among them

The practical measures to be
adopted will require much
consideration - the main thing
at present is to derive the end
