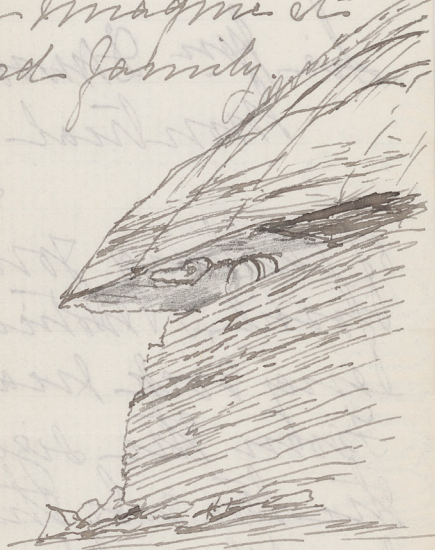

I take the liberty
of calling your attention to a
fossil I noticed in an exchange-
ing rock near Cape Ozo, Gaspe.
From the size of the head and
the two ribs that are exposed, I
would suppose it to be very large.
I thought it would be of interest
to a gentleman of your geological
knowledge. The rock is on the
south shore of Gaspe Bay, about
one mile west of Cape Ozo, about six

miles east of Gaspi village.

I regret I did not take a correct sketch of the fossil. I will attempt a secondary sketch. You will perhaps be able to form some idea of its value. I can unfortunately have little knowledge of geology, but would imagine it belonged to the lizard family.



Position of fossil in rock. I find my memory fails me in sketching the fossil. I wrote to the Rev. A. Whitehead, Missionary at Cape Ozo, and enquired if the rock had fallen away. He wrote

saw it. I think the fossil is about
ten or twelve feet from the ground.
The rocks are quite close to the
water.
