Some few years ago I sent you a specimen of Stromatopora so well preserved that you made it in part the subject of your microscopic report a copy of which you kindly sent me. I have lately found in the Clinton at Throold a form allied to *Cerostroma* I think, but it has this strange peculiarity that each lamina or layer is separated by a thin layer of clay and that each layer is about the sixteenth of an inch and complete within itself both on the upper and under side the clay matter between is sometimes extremely thin but varies, and sometimes the layers coalesce but do not

am to write. I have
two specimens found at dif-
ferent times one is polished
and the other in the rough state
you will see where the layers
have separated the star like form
on the upper surface quite dis-
tinct. I should like much
that you should see them
and if you could spare the
time I will send them to
you, if you wish one you
could divide the larger piece
and return me that portion
which shows the radiating star
like form exposed on the upper
layer
