Dear W. D. Donney,

Your kind
letter of June 17 reaches
me at this place where

I thank you
very much for your kindness
in the matter of George's
application to the N.S. I had
received and returned
the form before I got
your letter. I however
I would have returned
it as you advise.

The only members of
the A.S. here are Dr
Selwyn & Dr Hunt.
The latter has been
absent for a long
time in the U.S.
and I do not certainly
know his address.
The former I had
doubts about from
observing that the
name of the Director ^{in England}
was not attached to
recommendations of

his staff. I have no

like. I shall look with
much interest for your
staff adobop, and may
mention one thing which
has very much struck
me of late namely the
thinning of the crumpled
Lamentan crust. This
agrees with the results

of Damm Damm & Meade
as to the small thickness
of the layer of copper
The evidence that strikes
me is the persistence of
great distances of double
veins in a straight line
across all the crumples
of the Laurentian. This it
seems to me proves that
the crumpled crust is
a mere veneer of no
consequence at all in
comparison to a thick and
uniform wide crust. The
great slope may be due to
a Laurentian crust which
is a case in point.
