I received yours of 13th & 17th instant. Capt Stewart and his daughter left last night by train for Niagara. I think they enjoyed their visit to our City. Mr Bernard came up and together we drove a him over the farm and explained to him all that had been done and remained yet to be done in the matter of winding up the Estate. In a memo: I gave to Capt S. for his brother I said, that I considered \$2500⁺ a ample remuneration for administering the Estate & that this amount would include a Clerk's salary. also that the office at present occupied by the Estate might be rented and a room found in Mr Simard's office for the Clerk. That sales of single lots at full prices should be pushed but that in the meantime no great sacrifice should be made as I felt sure that the property would advance in value before many years. Mr Grant (also Stewart appears to be determined that he shall go) said that I thought his services should be retained until the end of Dec next so as to give him a chance of looking out for something else to do and that as he (Mr Stewart) had made the appointment he should also cancel it through you.
