subject.

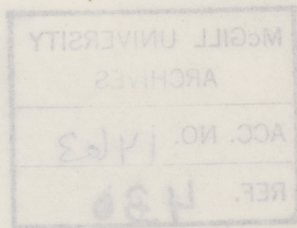
