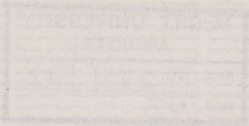

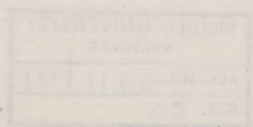
My dear Sir

I think you
misunderstand the para-
graph you quote in yours
of this morning. I take
it to mean that at
the graduates are not
subject to the Faculty
nor under its tuition,
it can have no
rules for them but
only for students, con-
sequently when graduates

The same principle
applies to post-graduate
students attending any
classes in the college,

but must conform to

students.

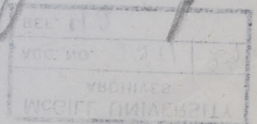

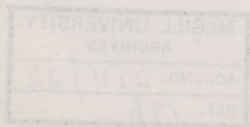
