The end proposed by this University in its course
of study for the degree of B. A. is two-fold:—
First and chiefly, — To educate the mind
secondly — To impart knowledge: viz of
Science and Literature

The Ordinary degree of B. A. represents a
Common standard of ~~education~~ ^{education} and
(as far as possible) of amount of knowledge,
but not necessarily an identity in the
kind (or branches) of knowledge.

This absence of identity in the branches of knowledge
required for the degree, (which is already admitted
as a principle in the case of Professional and
Honour Students) it is now proposed

advantage so as to be gained in the way, affording to many of the
religions of the world.

It is thus possible for a large and a small college
to have one common degree. For it, they may
both have a common standard of education and
require an equal amount of knowledge; but, as
option (within certain limits) being allowed to

the student with respect to the subjects of study,
the larger college can offer a wider range
to choose from. In this range of choice
allow, should the difference between the
courses of study of the colleges consist.

To attain this common standard for the degree
there ought to be, for both colleges:—

- 1st A uniformity in the curriculum, as far as possible.
- 2nd An adequate staff of Professors in each
- And to test the attainment of it, there ought to be
- 3^{rdly} — Common Examinations

To carry out these principles in the affiliation of
Morin College, Quebec, the following arrangement
are proposed for consideration:—

I || Length of curriculum and subjects of Examination ||

The full course of study shall extend over four years.

There shall be two University Examinations, one at
the end of the second and the other (for B. A.) at
the end of the fourth year. These shall be conducted
by Examiners appointed by the ^{corporation of the} University.

There shall also be a Matriculation Examination
at the beginning of the first year, for which the
subjects shall be fixed by the University. It shall
be regarded as a University Examination, but
shall be conducted by each college separately,
for its own students.

II Arrangements for Examinations (B. A. 82nd year)

The time shall be such as to allow ending of session near
1st of May

The place shall be each City for the Students of its own College
for the Ordinary Examinations but it is deemed highly
desirable that in the Examinations for Honours there

Subjects

should be a Common View once Examination at that
One Examiner from each College in every subject
in which it presents Students for Examination shall
be recommended by the respective Faculties to
the Corporation.

The Examiners shall divide the work of setting the
papers and each shall examine all the answers
to his own questions.

In the Examinations in Classics, half the books
shall be selected from the authors previously
lectured upon in the Colleges.

The Examiners in Classics for one year shall
choose the books for the following year

and Butler's sermons
on Human Nature
with Preface
to be selected from
Sermons in Volume of
Sermons for the Year
suggested by Dr. Seach.

Every student, in order to pass, must show a competent knowledge of all the subjects of Examination. For classification, there shall be two classes and a pass [suggested, that our present arrangement should hold, in which the pass is called third class.] The marks shall be reduced to the standard of the best man.

[Suggested also — that the value of the subjects shall be as heretofore in St. Gill College viz. Classics and Mathematics to be each two, and the rest one.]

III Miscellaneous.

The place for conferring degrees shall be Montreal.

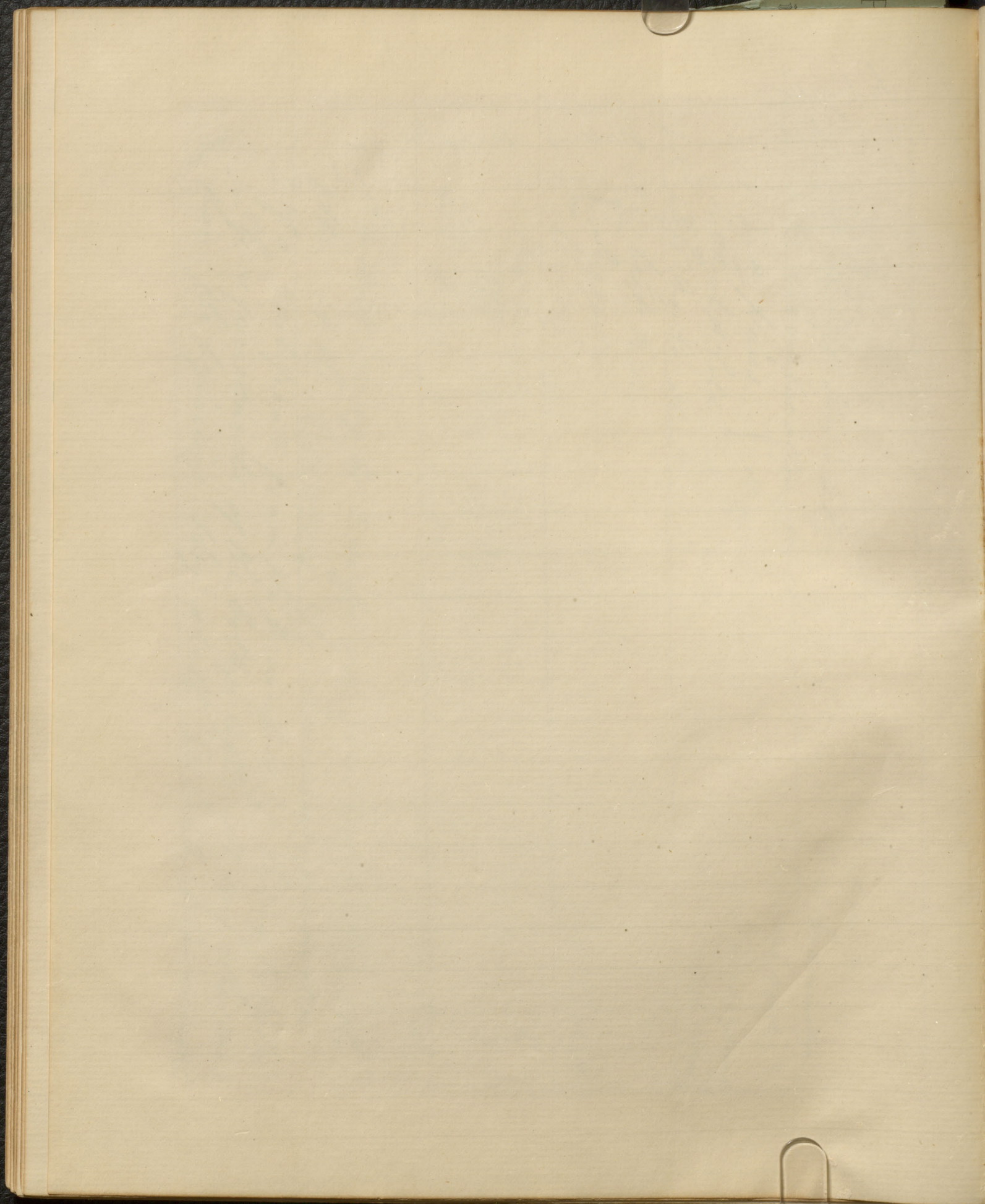
Students may be transferred from one college to the other at the beginning of a session on production of a certificate from the Principal of having fulfilled the requirements of the college left. At any other time than the beginning they shall be liable to examination.

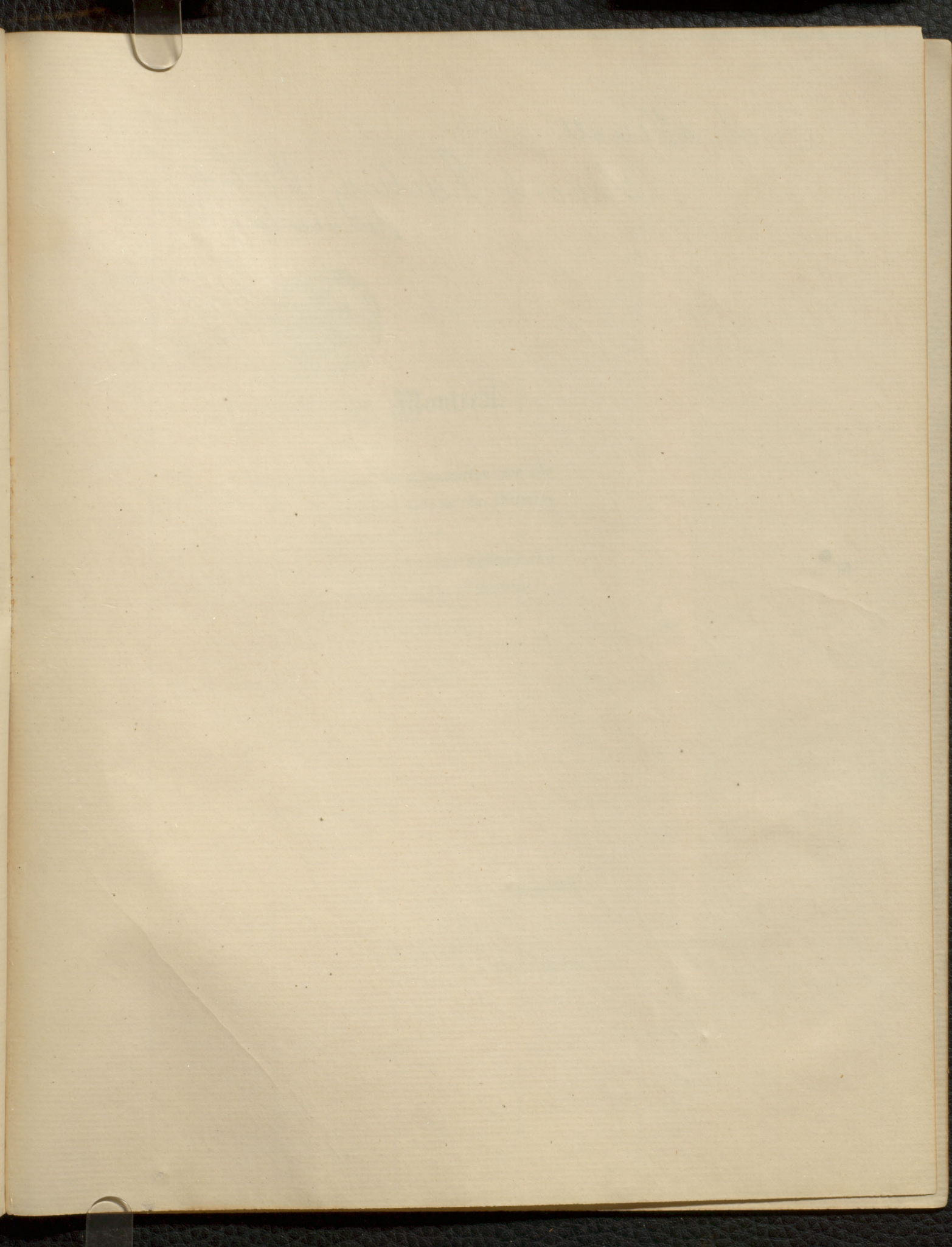
in the college which they wish to enter, besides being required to produce the certificate. There shall be at least one seasonal examination yearly in Modern colleges.

IV. Exceptions to the General Regulations.

Students may enter at the beginning of the 2nd year, cost present allowed by McGill College (on the same conditions) Professional students in Law or Medicine shall be only required to take Latin instead of classes at the B. A. Examination, and Mechanics & Hydrostatics instead of Mixed Mathematics [Dr Johnson or on further consideration has suggested Hydrostatics instead of Astronomy] with two other divisions.

Honour students may pass into of the 4 subjects required for B. A. at the end of the 3rd year and in the remaining two at the Ordinary B. A. Ex. The amount of the subjects at the end of the 3rd year to be determined by Conference hereafter. Certificatees from the Colleges of having passed this part to be accepted.
