



PREFACE.



FACULTY OF ARTS.

VERY one knows the subject matter of the Faculties of Law or Medicine but some have only a misty conception of the meaning of the term "Arts" when the Faculty of "Arts" is spoken of. This probably arises from the different senses in which the word Arts may be taken. It is applied to (1) the Liberal Arts; (2) Mechanical Arts; (3) the Fine Arts. The Faculty of Arts deals only with what by long-established usage are called the "Liberal Arts", i. e. the arts which supply the basis of a "liberal" education and the appropriate if not necessary introduction to the studies of the "learned" professions.

The subdivisions of the liberal arts stated broadly are Literature and Science. The chief subjects of study in this Faculty in McGill University, if classified under these headings, are as follows:

LITERATURE.—Classical Literature and History; Hebrew and
Oriental Literature; English Language, Literature
and History; French Language and Literature;
German Language and Literature.

SCIENCE.—Mathematics and Natural Philosophy; Experimental Physics; Geology and Natural History; Chemistry and Mineralogy; Botany.

There are 21 Professors, Lecturers and Assistants teaching the above subjects. The number of Students in the present session is 347 of whom 116 are women. The classes for women are totally separate from those for men in the subjects necessary for the B. A. degree.

FACULTY OF MEDICINE.

HAT is now the Medical Faculty of McGill University was established in October 1822, under the name of the Montreal Medical Institution.

The men who established this the first Medical School in this country were John Stephenson, Andrew Ferdinand Holmes, William Robertson and William Caldwell.

The first session of which there is any record is that of 1824-25, at which twenty-five students attended.

The Medical Institution continued for five sessions, and in 1829 became the Medical Faculty of McGill College.

The lectures were suspended during the political troubles of the rebellion, and it is owing to this gap that the present session is only the sixtieth, although the faculty was reorganized in 1829. In reality, this is the sixty-fifth session of the School, which is the direct continuation of the Medical Institution and the sixty-ninth year since its foundation in 1824.

The Lectures of the Medical Institution were given at No. 20 St. James St.; the School afterwards moved to St. George St.; from 1845 to 1852 the lectures were delivered in the College Building, Sherbrooke St.; from 1852 to 1872 in the Faculty Building, Coté St.; and in 1872 the south wing of the present Medical buildings was erected by the Governors in the University Grounds.

In 1885, through the liberality of Sir Donald Smith in founding the Leanchoil Endowment and of the citizens of Montreal and Medical Graduates, in subscribing to the Campbell Memorial Fund, the Faculty was enabled to largely increase the original building adding chemical laboratories and laboratories for physical and pathological work together with an additional lecture room.

The students then numbered about 200 to 230. This year the number of students has reached 320, and additional buildings are to be erected on the grounds this summer of 1893.

In order to do this it would have been necessary for the Faculty to have largely entrenched on their Endowment Fund, had it not been for the kindness and generosity of John H. R. Molson, Esquire, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, who voluntarily came forward with a donation sufficient not only to cover the cost of the expensive buildings proposed by the Faculty, but also for the purchase of the land intervening between the College Grounds and Carleton Road, near the Royal Victoria Hospital.

The buildings when completed next October will have a total length of 250 feet and will have an entrance from Carleton Road near the new Royal Victoria Hospital and another from the College Grounds.







FACULTY OF LAW.

HE Members of the Faculty of Law and its objects and position are indicated by the following statement put forth on the re-organization of the Faculty under the W. C. McDonald Endowment in 1890.

The said Endowment so generously made by W. C. McDonald, Esq., places the Faculty in a position to offer to those who desire to study Law, either with a view to practice as a Profession, or as a means of culture, or as a qualification for the discharge of higher duties of citizenship, a comprehensive and complete course of Legal study, with the use of Library, Reading Room and other aids which have not hitherto been at the command of the Faculty. The Course of Study extends over a period of three years. Under the New Endowment a number of well known names have been added to the Faculty, and the Course largely specialized. A salaried Dean has been appointed to devote his who time to the interests of the work. The Library has been largely augmented by several bequests, and provision is made for an annual supply of all the latest works deemed desirable.

Montreal affords undoubted advantages for students studying Law on account of the great variety of legal business transacted and the constant meetings of the principal Courts of the Province.

The Notarial Profession has been fully provided for, a Professor being appointed, whose Course of Lectures will be attended by all Professional Students.

With a view of extending its usefulness the Faculty have arranged a Course of Lectures on Commercial Subjects, so that young men employed in commercial pursuits, as well as students in other departments of the University may be able to avail themselves of its advantages.





FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCE.

N 1855 Sir Wm. Dawson in his inaugural address, pointed out the necessity in the University of a department of Practical Science; and in the following year Q. C. Keefer, C.E. (who however never lectured) was appointed Professor of Hydraulic Engineering, and Robert Crawford, B.A., Professor of Road and Railway Engineering, the Professorship being in the Faculty of Arts. The latter was succeeded in 1857 by Mark J. Hamilton, C.E., who held the post-till 1865. The first graduate was Olive Gooding who in 1858 received the diploma of Civil Engineer. The whole number of graduates up to 1865 when the department lapsed was fifteen. In 1871 it was reorganized as a department of the Faculty of Arts, with a three years course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Applied Science, the professors being C. F. Armstrong, C.E. now of Edinburgh University, Dr. Harrington, Dr. Girdwood, Dr. T. Sterry Hunt, and two years later Professor McLeod. In 1876 Prof. Armstrong resigned and was succeeded temporarily by C. A. Harris until Professor Bovey's appointment in December of the same year.

In 1878 the Faculty of Applied Science was constituted, with Professor Bovey as Dean an I with the staff increased by the addition of Professor Chandler; and the course was also lengthened by adding to it a preliminary optional year. There were then twenty-eight students, and in the years from 1878-1890 this number increased to seventy-five. In that year a new career was opened up for the Faculty by the series of munificent endowements of W. C. McDonald, and Thomas Workman. Since then the present splendidly equipped buildings have been erected, chairs of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering have been founded, and the staff has been increased by the appointment of Professors Cox, Nicolson, and Carus-Wilson, and of Messrs. Carlyle and Lea as lecturers.

In one year the number of students increased to 125 and at present stands at about 170. With its present unequalled facilities, and with an increase in the staff proportional to its growing needs, the Applied Science Faculty of McGill University will easily maintain a leading position among the Engineering Institutions of the world.

Faculty of Comparative Medicine and Veterinary Science:

HE Faculty had for its origin the School of Veterinary Science known as the "Montreal Veterinary College," which was founded in 1866, by the Dean of the present Faculty; as such, it was conducted with marked success for twenty-four years; students being attracted to it from nearly every State in the Union as well as from the Canadian Provinces.

The aim of the School being to raise the educational and social status of the veterinarian. Many of the graduates occupy important positions in both

countries, as scientific teachers, experts, and practitioners.

In 1889 a Faculty of Comparative Medicine and Veterinary Science was added to the Faculties of the University, and the Staff of the Veterinary School were appointed Professors, Duncan McEachran, F.R.C.V.S., V.S., Edin., D.V.S., McGill, being appointed Dean, and Professor of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery.




