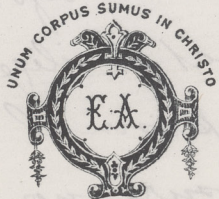

My dear Sir William Dawson,

I am much obliged for two kind letters received from you; and I am glad to have the little account you send me. We certainly are unwilling that you should bear this cost yourself. We were only too thankful to have your help, and the least we can do is - to pay this little bill, especially as we did not provide hospitality for you during any part of the time you were in town. I therefore enclose cheque for £2.13.0

Your kind reference to my promised visit to Canada, is very gratifying; and I shall quite hope

to have the pleasure of seeing you on the other side of the Atlantic before very long. It was a very great privilege to me when I made your personal acquaintance; and, I assure you, I shall gladly renew it as soon as the opportunity presents itself. From conversation I had with other Canadian Delegates, I feel sure that much good would follow a visit in connection with which we might have meetings on behalf of the Alliance.

I am still hoping that I may have the gratification of seeing you in London before you return to Canada; but, if not, please allow me in the name of our Council (which met yesterday, for the first time since the Con-



-ference, and desired me specially to write to you) to give you our warmest thanks for the valuable help you rendered us at the meetings in connection with our jubilee.

I do not think I mentioned to you, in my last, the delightful visit I paid with 7 of our Delegates, to the Bishop of Exeter. On the second day of our visit, we had a meeting of a unique character. His Lordship had invited all the Non-conformist ministers of his diocese, with ~~out~~ about 100 of his clergy; and 200 altogether, accepted. It was a delightful exhibition of real Christian union; and the gracious, brotherly way in which the Bishop treated

his guests, made a wonderfully good  
impression. Mr Dodge of New York,  
especially, seemed charmed with  
the visit.
