Dearest William

I have received & now thank you for the few lines you wrote on board the "City of Quebec". I was glad to hear you got down safely but now look forward longingly for another letter, yet must not expect it before Thursday the 5th & then it will have been written a week. You are very far away. I hope you have prospered in all your work & that you will be prepared to turn your face homeward by the

7th. Should I receive a letter from
you next week saying you remain
until the 14th I shall write again,
otherwise this will be my last to Gaspi.
I hope to write to Quebec to meet you
on your return there. I wrote in
good time for last weeks boat
to Gaspi & Anna William & I wrote
again later but the upgoing boat
being off time I fear it would be
too late for Lewis Chys boat from
Quebec. So please assure Perry
that we are not overlooking him
altho' we have been so unfortunate
as to miss two opportunities of writing.
I am thankful to say we are all

well & the time continues to pass
very pleasantly. We have been a very
small family for some time but
have had friends to take tea with
us pretty often. Then there are meetings
which we more or less enjoy. Last
Wednesday we had a very nice Scripture
meeting at our house. This we intend
to continue. Herbert Paddy professes to have
found Jesus as his Saviour, & from
being openly opposed to the Cecil meetings
now takes the liberalist interest in all
of them. One of his servants also gives
great evidence of being changed.
The Misses Hunt arrived today
& I take the opportunity of this having
returned early to write to you. On Wednesday

Mary Ambrose dropped in for
a moment on his way to Cape au
L'Ange & quite ready to avail herself
of the slightest invitation from us. Her
father is also coming here — to this place.

The young children here had a
great deal of pleasure in the Croquet
their interest in it has never flagged.

There has been a good deal of rain yet
the temperature is very delightful.

I had a letter from Mrs. Crane today —
she tells me Mrs. Stott is on this side the
Atlantic. I may see us, as they intend to travel
a little before recrossing. How sorry I should
be to miss seeing Maymie. I wanted almost
to go to Montreal on purpose. She surely will
write before hand? I have written asking
Mr. Steward to pay us a visit here. As William
has written to George & Anna, intends to do so
he must be content with my love. They will
give him any floating news. I shall be glad
when your Gaspé expedition comes to a successful
end. meantime accept the love of your
