The weather today is very warm, but I
 have got the shade of a bush here,
 beside some boulders on the
 edge of the river, which is tolerable.

I wrote to you the other day from Lillooet, but found out afterwards that the letter would not leave here till today & would only reach the railway here tomorrow, so that the news will be older than this when it reaches Swet's.

I hope that you will not let anything curtail the length of your holiday which is so important from the point of view of next winter's work.

I am quite well & do not suffer from the heat.
