

Kamloops B.C.

Aug. 10. 1890

My dear Father,

We got back here yesterday & are today spending a quiet Sunday in camp. I have now received proof of my R.S. paper to Gully 19 & shall return the whole to me by tomorrow. I shall try to arrange to be able to attend to the remainder promptly, as it is essential that I should have the chance of looking it over.

Yesterday I spent some time at Tranquille looking for plants, but with very poor success, getting nothing worth sending to you, in fact scarcely anything at all.

There is a great thickness of tuffaceous beds, & possibly some thin layers rich in plants may occur, but if so we could not find them.

I chanced on some evidently Triassic fossils the other day (Wollenses) which throw a good deal of extra light on the structure here in general. On leaving Kambrope I propose going up the North Thompson for a few days, but not far, to examine some rocks there more closely. After this I shall probably head south South & east of Kambrope for a time.

Weather continues warm, with a tendency to thunder storms, but not so hot as at some times before.

I have to thank you for copy each of the Times & nature received here, & also for looking over the proof of my Res. paper, in which I find you have made a number of improvements.
