Dear Warriner,

We had quite a
thunder-storm on Thursday last
which cooled down the air a little, but
now it has begun to get hot again

you find things, places, & people. But
I suppose you are so busy going about
that you have hardly any time to
write. Kind you don't overtax
yourself, as you know you were
counting on quite a rest when you
got to Scotland to make up for all

Your London excitement & worry.

I don't understand the seaside arrangements at all, but then perhaps you don't yourself as yet. Both St. Andrews & Broom's Barn are very near Edinburgh, & not very much out of the way, which is rather a disadvantage in some respects. St. Andrews is too I expect a place of resort, which would make it rather disagreeable. But then I suppose if we go with the B's & P's we would have to consult their tastes & both these disadvantages would probably be advantages in their view.

I am almost afraid that I will not be able to go down by boat, as the boats only sail Saturdays & Wednesdays & I hardly think I would be able to get off Saturday July 1st (Especially if the Physic exam is on that day as is quite probable) & it would be waste of time to wait till Wednesday.

I hardly know where to address this letter but trusting to chance will send it to Messrs Edinburgh. With best love to yourself & the Bells & Pinnacles wherever you are with.
