My Dear Mamma,

I this morning
received your note, & was
very glad to hear that you
had safely arrived, & were
well.

Ellen who was staying here
with us this morning got
a telegram to say that her
servant was ill, & has had
to go off before us. We have
just come up from the boat

where we have been seeing
her off. Lina & myself
are now alone here &
intend to start - tomorrow
about noon for Edinburgh.
Things are in considerable
confusion as you may
imagine.

I see by the paper that the
Canadian mail was
landed at Londonderry
on Monday. You will
most probably have got

letters by it before this
reaches.

The carpet-bag key cannot
be found at Belmont Place,
& I cannot find either my
cloak-strap, or trunk-
strap I suppose either you
or Papa must have
taken them.

You do not mention, ~~it~~
perhaps you have not yet
ascertained the hour on

Thursday on which the steamer
sails, but I fancy this will
be the last letter which will
reach in time to catch

You, I will try to find
time however tomorrow
evening to write a few
lines, & will address them
to Mrs Crow's office, if I
can find the address.

Lina sends love & wishes
you a very pleasant passage.
Please, remember me
kindly to Mr & Mrs Crow &
with much love & hopes
that your voyage may be
a short & easy one.
