Yesterday the applied mechanics exam
passed off. I am afraid I have
not done well but will not trouble
myself any more about now that it
is over. I now awake to the fact that
just five days remain to grind up
the Natural History. At present I have
not made any plans, I have decided
not to do so till the exams are over.
Then I will set to work & pack up &
do all the business which I must do
here before leaving. I don't suppose I will
be able to get through in less than a
week. I don't know whether to go to
Cornwall or not before sailing.

I would much rather go straight
home but as you say, it seems a pity
to leave here without as I may not
have the opportunity again. If I go

I will probably go with Gory Hueley.
Phillips whom I had formerly thought of
going with has changed his plans & is
not going till later in the season.

The steamers of the London line call at
Plymouth. So if I went to Cornwall
the best plan would be to leave nearly
all my luggage in charge of the agents
here & meet the steamer myself at
Plymouth. However, at present I
purposely abstain from planning, &
will be guided more or less by what
opinions I have on the subject in
my next letters.

I am going out to Prof Ramsay's
dinner this evening with Phillips. Ramsay
& family are about to leave town
for the summer.

I had a card for an afternoon party
from Lady Lyell. It was for Wednesday
last &

So of course I could not think of
going. I have not yet sent the Maple
Sugar. As I will have to call before
leaving I think I will put it off till
then.

As for any ^{thing} scientific, or instructive, or
new, for the students evenings ~~or~~ I fear
the quest will be vain. I have been on
the look out but have not seen a
single novelty of any kind.

You do not say in your letters when
you expect Papa & William back from
Nova Scotia. I suppose their stay there
will not be for more than a few weeks.

I fear you will all find the weather
in Montreal very hot. - Staying there so
