My dear Sister

I came over here on the second instant leaving your box packed and ready to be sent when we had instructions from George as to where it was to be forwarded. The bills were clasped together and placed inside the box and the key sent to George that he might use his discretion with them in dealing with the Custom House people.

but I now learn that he
himself is going by Nova-
Scotia and is sending all
his packages including this
one direct to Montreal.

Had I been aware in time
I would have rather in-
closed the accounts by let-
ter to you. Under the
circumstances I think it
would be desirable that
whoever goes to receive the
luggage should endeavour
to pass that box without
having it opened.

As far as I remember the
whole articles amounted
to about \$21.12/ this value
being stated may satisfy

without the goods being dis-
turbed, Mrs. Mercer had
no white lace such as you
wanted he said it would
cost 6 or 7/6^{per} yard I therefore
sent 2 yds same as the black
but if you still want it I
~~if~~ could send it by letter

I got the flowers at Ken-
nington, as they had none
at Nicholson St. good enough
the prices of them appeared
to me high but they are
the finest. they had a sale
of flowers at the time and
I managed to pick out two
bunches of yellow roses and
white lilac (which I got for
4/6) about as much in bulk

as all the rest put together

I also got a pale blue
shawl for 6 pence which
I thought very good value
^{so much so} that I took other five of
different colours amongst
our own family. I am
sporting a purple one my-
self here. I made the best
bargain I could for every
thing so that the bills are
net to the last penny.

We regret that George could
not spare time to join us
here as I am sure he wd
have enjoyed this place
much. I will coo Ellen
to give you a description
of the house &c &c with
much love I remain your
