My Dear Mamma
I left Toronto yesterday
morning by train & arrived here about
12:15. All yesterday it rained
more or less. There were several very
heavy showers so it was fortunate
that I had no out-door occupation
for the day. I met my folks here &
today we have been away back
in the country looking at our

starting I went over at once to Lister.

The Primroses received me very kindly
& gave me quite a hodge-podge of
news. I need not say you surprised
I was to find that Papa is to be down
here again so soon. It will be very
pleasant to meet him & return.

I have not heard as yet about the
boats & sail on to Montreal but I
suppose they have not arrived here as
someone would have mentioned the fact.
I will address this letter to Montreal as
I find what Anna says for me I
doubt he there by this time. I hope your
visit to Caen has been an enjoyable one.

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3) In Halyas I did not see very
much but then I don't think there is
very much to see beyond the general aspect of
the town. I visited the Provincial Museum
which is under Dr Honeyman's able manage-
ment. Papa sent me a Card of introduction
to him but I remembered that he had
stayed with us in Montreal, & so did
not use it. I simply walked up to him
& said "How do you do Dr Honeyman!"
He looked considerably surprised at first, but
in a minute he suddenly recollected

Two morning his files got a carriage &
we went all up the East River & then
turned off to the back settlement to see
a piece of land where you see
The distance from N. Glasgow is
altogether about 17 miles & the road..
