 we hope for a better lot by the
 Anti Colonial. Young Mrs Bath
 you know is on board, also
 Miss Garland who taught
 Anna at Miss Simpsons.

I rec'd say good bye now,
 My work from Derry, but
 probably nothing would be gained
 by writing before Liverpool.

The ginger, (both kinds)
is my food.

In conclusion please doubt-
trouble none about me. If
I have lost it - is irreparable,
or many better people have been
worse treated in this dog hell
of a world. I daresay I shall
have a very pleasant time
abroad. I feel very sorry to
leave Fother with so much to do,
but was too miserable in
Montreal to stay there.
