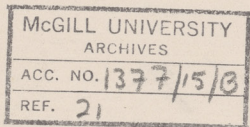


Ottawa. <sup>George</sup>  
Monday 22 April  
1889



My dear Mother,

I have just  
received a note from father  
in which he informs me,  
amongst other things, that you  
& Eva have migrated to  
Lachute for a few days rest.  
Lachute never occurred to  
me as a haven when you  
spoke of taking a trip of the  
River, but it is certainly a  
pretty little place & I dare  
say you will be able to  
pass a few days there very  
pleasantly if the weather keeps  
fine, & not so cold as it

was yesterday. If you  
 should feel inclined to attend  
 your presentation as far  
 as Ottawa, you might  
 let me know & I shall  
 be glad to find quarters  
 for you at our hotel here,  
 not having anything more  
 I would like to offer.  
 I am very anxious to see  
 the letter and of my work,  
 or was properly speaking  
 of that part of it which  
 I propose, presenting before  
 going into the field again,  
 which should be some time



in the early part of  
 next month. I believe it  
 would be a very good plan  
 for you to take a trip then  
 out as far as Bauff as
